







WHAT Data Gaps and Challenges?

Data gaps on children living in migration or forced displacement are hampering our response










Children outside of their home countries: 3.5 million in LAC countries

In 2020, the number of foreign-born persons in LAC countries reached 14 million – Almost 3.5 million of them were children

Number of international migrants by age, 1990 to 2020 (in millions)





Forcibly displaced children: too many

As of 2021, 3.2 million children in LAC countries had been displaced as a result of conflict and violence

157 thousand asylum seekers





Disasters are a major cause of new displacements in the LACRO region – but conflict and violence lead to large numbers of children in protracted displacement







How do we address the data challenges?



Political

- Child sensitivity: many policies and programs designed without a child lens
- Competing political priorities
- Lack of political will
- Migration and displacement can be contentious
- Lack of effective messaging around importance of data for informing policies and programmes

Technical & substantive

- Differences in definitions, standards and methodologies
- Lack of agedisaggregated data
- Difficulty capturing data on vulnerable groups
- Poor coordination among stakeholders (i.e., national statistical authorities and line ministries)

Systemic & structural

- Key stakeholders often have competing priorities and mandates
- Lack of capacity both human and financial
- Ministries, other bodies producing data on children on the move and policymakers often operate in silos.
- Lack of cross-country data sharing and use

- ✓ Helps countries' national statistical systems develop their capacity to produce data on children on the move
- ✓ Provides guidance on child-specific principles and protections necessary to produce and process data

Guidelines on child-specific indicators

- ✓ Recommends key indicators for countries to prioritize to help them monitor the rights and wellbeing of migrant and displaced children
- ✓ Includes **10 priority indicators** across Health, Education, Child Protection and Poverty, and **17** additional indicators

Other publications

- ✓ Provides a conceptual framework for understanding the multiple, overlapping categories of children on the move
- ✓ Unpacks key migration and displacement **terms** as they relate to children

Better Data for Children on the Move: 5 Strategic Action Points

- Make special efforts to collect and analyse data on children



A tool to support the Global Pledge: Integrated Data Ecosystem Assessment and Strengthening (IDEAS)


Objectives of IDEAS

- Comprehensively map existing data
- Identify gaps and good practices in national data system and capacities
- Provide recommendations on how to sustainably enhance the collection, analysis and use of high-quality, timely and disaggregated data on children on the move at the country level

Modules

- General module (legal and political settings, national migration data strategy, basic migration statistics and disaggregation, interagency coordination, data sharing)
- Topic specific module (child protection, education, child asylum seekers, detention, statelessness)
